CREATION – INDISPENSABLE ARTICLE OF CHRISTIAN DOCTRINE

If you've driven through the country anytime recently you've undoubtedly noticed the fall harvest is now in full swing. The vast abundance of corn and soybeans, pumpkins and popcorn and apples and other produce, is a tremendous and tangible testament to the goodness of God's creation!

For people like us, who hold the historic Christian faith, harvest time cannot but help bring to mind the First Article of the Apostles' Creed: "I believe in God the Father Almighty, Maker of heaven and earth." We believe God has made each one of us and all other creatures, including all the good created things that sustain our lives, such as the grain and fruit and vegetables currently being harvested.

Perhaps you haven't thought about it much, but the Scriptural teaching of creation is an indispensable article of the Christian doctrine; Christianity cannot stand without it. Of course, every article of the Christian doctrine is necessary, for each in some way touches on the very Heart of Christianity: our Lord Jesus Christ — who He is and what He does. The article of creation is no exception. We cannot tamper with the teaching of creation without tampering with the teaching of Christ!

For example, the Scriptural teaching of creation establishes right away the true character of God. He is the loving God, who serves and blesses His creation. It is no surprise then – in fact, we would expect it – that God would earnestly desire to rescue and restore His creation, which had become ruined by man's sin. Enter Jesus Christ!


If, on the other hand, God were not our Creator, what would He be? Either He would not exist at all (and in that case, so much for Christianity!), or He would have to be some power-hungry intruder from the "outside" who wishes to dominate what is not rightfully His. But fictional being such as that is hardly the God who became flesh in Jesus Christ, served His people in humility, and suffered and died to save us!

The article of creation also establishes the almighty, creative power of God's word. He created the entire universe (with the unique exceptions of Adam and Eve, whom He formed specially) simply by declaring: "Let there be...." This creative power of God's word is absolutely essential in Christianity. The power of God's word alone effects the new creation in us; only the divine word of the gospel makes us alive and spiritually new in Christ. The power of God's word alone will bring about the new heaven and earth when Christ returns on the last day – the ultimate hope of the Christian faith.

The truth that God created us also establishes human accountability to Him. Since God is our Creator He knows what is good for us, and He has every right to direct our lives according to His wise and loving will. If God were not our Creator, we would not be answerable to Him; we could simply live however we pleased. And in that case, we would have no need for Christ at all. For if we didn't have to face God on judgment day, we wouldn't need Jesus and His forgiveness. That very clearly shows how creation is indispensable to Christianity.

Now, it is well known that many people, perhaps even most people, deny and attack the Scriptural teaching of creation. They choose to believe unproved man-made hypotheses about the origin of the world and all the living things that inhabit it, such as the various evolutionary theories. All these notions are completely incompatible with God's word. Besides that, they have never been observed, and they are scientifically flawed at many points. (You might consider visiting the websites of *Answers in Genesis* and of *Creation Moments* to learn more about the scientific side of this. You can also read the inserts from *Creation Moments* we place in our church bulletins once a month.)

September 10, 2018

President Tom Ivey called the meeting to order. A quorum was present. Pastor Bishop opened with devotions.

A motion by Nancy Drockelman, seconded by Randy Couch, was made to approve the June 2018 Parish Report – motion carried. A motion by Howie Proehl, seconded by Tracy Glass, was made to approve the July 2018 Parish Report – motion carried. A motion was made by Ray Barnes, seconded by Dave Drockelman, was made to approve the August 2018 Parish Report – motion carried.

A motion was made by Howie Proehl, seconded by Dave Drockelman, to approve the June 2018 minutes – motion carried.

Treasurer's Report – Daryl Dagit presented the June 2018 Treasurer's Report. Nancy Drockelman moved, seconded by Steve Depew, to approve the June 2018 Treasurer's Report – motion carried. Daryl then presented the July 2018 Treasurer's Report. Dave Kesselmayer moved, seconded by Don Schoedel, to approve the July 2018 Treasurer's Report – motion carried. Daryl presented the August 2018 Treasurer's Report. Howie Proehl moved, seconded by Nancy Drockelman, to approve the August 2018 Treasurer's Report – motion carried.

Board of Trustees – Dave Kesselmayer reported that Ameren has a program for energy efficient lighting. Areas needing updated lighting are the gym, youth room, and the church basement. It was determined that the youth room is first priority as the lights currently do not work. A contractor is selling the fixtures at their cost installed not to exceed \$2,600. An anonymous donor has contributed \$1,000 towards this project.

The Trustees will be removing the railings on the front of the church this week in preparation of concrete work to be done. They request that members use the ramp entrance and 8th Street side entrance while this project is being completed.

<u>Board of Elders</u> – Pastor Bishop recently attended a conference in Racine, WI. One of the presentations discussed ideas to bring back members to church. The Elders and Pastor will pay a short visit on Sunday afternoons to members who have been absent from church.

<u>Board of Christian Education</u> – No formal report. However, Pastor Bishop noted that the enrollment at Good Shepherd Lutheran School is the 2nd highest in its history. Youth activities and Sunday School classes continue.

Board of Worship – Mike Nauth reported that this Board met last week. Ushers are needed for both early and late services.

Board of Evangelism – The Committee would like to thank those who volunteered to work the Church booth at the Marigold Festival. It is always good to get our name and what we stand for out into the community.

There are some St. John's t-shirts left in sizes small, medium, large, X large and 2 XL.

The WVEL broadcasts are already in the budget until the end of 2018. A decision is needed on continuing the radio broadcasting of St. John's sermons by WVEL. A new contract would require budgeting for the first three months of 2019 although contributions from the congregation would be preferred to cover the charges of \$175 per week.

Greeters are needed for the 10:30 services.

Board of Stewardship – This Board is meeting every other month and did not meet this month.

Board of Finance – Daryl Dagit distributed the 2019 budget to the respective chairmen of the committees. The completed budgets needs to be returned to the Board by the October Voter's Meeting, discussed in November, and voted on in December.

<u>Long Range Planning Committee</u> – No report.

Educational Grant Fund Committee - No report.

East Bluff Property Committee – No report.

Constitution By-laws Committee – No report.

Unfinished Business – Continuation of the WVEL radio broadcast contract was discussed. So far the cost of \$175 per week has been donated by various church members. It was agreed that Pastor Bishop will sign another contract for the next six months. Members are being encouraged to prayfully consider sponsoring this outreach program.

New Business - Dan Rees attended the Central Illinois District Convention in Springfield with Pastor Bishop. Dan noted the election of officers, the various resolutions that were passed and those that were defeated.

Pat Proehl suggested that an ex-Muslim cleric that is now a Lutheran pastor in the Missouri Synod be invited as a guest minister and Bible class speaker. The Elders will review this suggestion and their recommendation will be discussed at the October Voter's Meeting.

Ray Barnes made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Randy Couch, and the meeting was adjourned and closed with the Lord's Prayer.
