ANGELS WE HAVE HEARD: "FEAR NOT!"

Fear can be a very powerful force. It can drive otherwise reasonable people to desperate or harmful behavior. For example, fear of being alone for many years might cause someone to marry a spouse who is very unsuitable, perhaps even abusive. Fear of the challenges and sacrifices of caring for a child in countless instances leads a frightened mother to have her own baby killed by abortion. Fear of pains and troubles and seeming hopelessness could lead a person to take his own life. Fear of ridicule, imprisonment, or violence could even lead a Christian to desert the holy faith and abandon the Lord Jesus! Fear is indeed a very powerful force!

In the Holy Scriptures, we hear numerous incidents in which the appearance of an angel caused someone to fear. For example, when the soldiers who were guarding Jesus' tomb saw an angel, they shook with fear and became like dead men. (Matt. 28:4) The women at the tomb were likewise full of fear when they saw the angel. (Mk. 16:5,8; Lk. 24:5) Even Zechariah, Mary the mother of our Lord, and the shepherds outside Bethlehem were frightened when angels came to visit them. (Lk. 1:12; 1:29-30; 2:9)

This is rather ironic, for in many instances, including all the ones just mentioned in the preceding paragraph, the Lord had sent the angels, not to instill fear, but to take away fear! God sent the angel to Jesus' tomb to announce His resurrection from the dead. This was good news that removes the fear of death!

God sent the angel to Zechariah to announce to him the impending birth of his son, John the Baptist. This was good news that heralded the imminent coming of the Savior of the world, and thus removes the fear of man's worst enemies: sin, devil, death, and hell!

God sent the angel to Mary to announce to her that she would be the mother of the Son of God. This was good news that meant the Lord's kingdom of mercy was at hand, and thus removes the fear of the proud and mighty, hunger and poverty, and every other evil!

God sent the angel to the shepherds to announce that Christ the Lord was born. This was good news that God had demonstrated His good will toward men, and was bringing about peace on earth through the reconciliation the Savior would effect. It thus removes the fear of God's wrath and punishment.

This is what God wants for all His people – to take away our fear! He assures us in His holy Word: "Perfect love casts out fear, for fear has to do with punishment." (1 John 4:18) Indeed, the good messages His angels announced to the Lord's faithful people in ages long past continue to cast out fear in the hearts of the faithful today!

This is why the theme for the sermons in our Advent Vespers and Christmas Day services this year is "Angels We Have Heard: 'Fear Not!'" We will be privileged to hear again the gladsome tidings the angels proclaimed to Zechariah, Mary, Joseph, and the Bethlehem shepherds, and to ponder how their proclamation of Christ removes our fears still today. We invite and urge everyone to come and listen and believe, so as to let the Lord cast out fear, and replace it with confidence, peace, and joy in Christ!
