By the time you are reading this little article, many folks will already have their Christmas decorations up. I saw someone in town putting up their outside Christmas decorations already over two weeks before Thanksgiving. I'm sure some people have even set up their Christmas trees by now, and have them trimmed with all sorts of lights, garlands, and ornaments. And they surely are beautiful! It seems almost everyone loves Christmas decorations and especially Christmas trees. By the time Christmas Day comes, most homes and many businesses will be graced with a festively decorated Christmas tree.

But what are all these Christmas trees really for? Are they merely beautiful decorations? Are they simply convenient shelters under which to place brightly wrapped gifts? Are they nothing more than a little economic boost for the tree growers and the artificial Christmas tree industry?

Christmas trees actually originated in Germany in the middle ages, likely as the "paradise tree," a prop used in a popular play about Adam and Eve. This evergreen tree was decorated with apples. As time went on, people began to associate the tree more with Christmas, and they added other decorations, such as cookies, nuts, fruit, paper roses, painted eggshells, and candles. A story that attributes the first decorated Christmas tree to Martin Luther is probably little more than pious legend. German immigrants introduced the Christmas tree custom to the United States, where it became widely popular in the mid-1800s.

Well, all this is somewhat interesting, but is it really of any help for us Christians? Is there anything about the Christmas tree that can assist us in our life of faith in Jesus Christ? There can be! For as with so many other customs, the value lies in the symbolism we attach to it. And the Christmas tree can indeed have strong symbolic value.

The evergreen branches remind us of everlasting life! Even though most natural Christmas trees are cut and therefore no longer living, their evergreen leaves vividly point to life – that the tree remains alive even in the winter, when deciduous trees appear lifeless. At Christmas time we rejoice that Jesus was born for the very purpose of giving us everlasting life! He came in the flesh so that, even when we die bodily and appear lifeless, our souls may remain alive with Him in glory, and so that our bodies may rise to everlasting life. All who believe in Him have this gift of life right now, even as He promises, "He who believes in Me has everlasting life." *John 6:47*

The lights on the Christmas tree remind us that Jesus was born to be the Light of the world! He is the One who gives the truth of salvation to all who will listen to Him and believe. Scripture says of Him, "The true Light, who gives light to every man, was coming into the world." *John 1:9*

The star that adorns the top of the Christmas tree likewise points us to Jesus, who is the long-prophesied Star of Jacob. (Numbers 24:17) It also reminds us how His birth was accompanied by the appearance of a special star, which led the wise men to find Him in Bethlehem. Just as the wise men rejoiced when they saw the star (Matthew 2:10), so we rejoice in the blessed reality of Christ's presence among us.

So you see, when we make these symbolic connections, the Christmas tree is much more than just a large and lovely decoration. It is a visual testament to the good news of Jesus' birth, and the gifts of life and salvation He gives us. May your Christmas tree serve to make You more mindful of Jesus, His presence, and His everlasting gifts to you!

Mike Nauth called the meeting to order. A quorum was present. Pastor Bishop opened with devotions.

A motion was made by Randy Couch, seconded by Julie Wagner, to approve the October Parish Report. Motion carried. Pastor Bishop did make a note that the individuals listed under the Released section of the report were removals.

The October meeting minutes were reviewed. A motion was made by Bob Oliverius, seconded by Cheryl Ivey, to approve the October meeting minutes. Motion carried.

Treasurer's Report – Nancy Drockelman presented the October Treasurer's Report. There were no unusual expenses for the month. We did pay the bill to City Coal & Asphalt for the resurfacing of the parking lots. Nancy also noted that in September we did get a check for \$10,000 from Comcast for rent. The budget for next year was made available and will be gone over in more detail in next month's meeting by Daryl Dagit. The proposed budget shows an increase of 4.4% over this year's budget. If there are any questions on specific items shown on the budget, please contact the committee chair. A motion was made by Dave Drockelman, seconded by Gary Pool, to accept the October Treasurer's Report. Motion carried.

<u>Board of Trustees</u> – Gary Pool reported that we have contracted with Dave Burling Excavation to handle snow removal this winter. Gary also thanked Jennifer Kesselmayer and Kathy Heisel for their help on Trustees' Work Day. Gary also noted that work continues on the men's restroom in the church basement and thanked Dan Watson for his help.

<u>Board of Elders</u> – Randy Couch reported that the Elders met on November 13th. Randy indicated that as noted earlier by Pastor Bishop, letters were sent to 3 individuals indicating that they are being released from the church role. The Elders also talked about possible nominees for the board for next year. The Elders are doing the Advent dinner on December 14th.

<u>Board of Finance</u> – Nancy Drockelman reported that the board met last week and worked on finalizing the proposed budget for next year. The CD's that were due are being renewed for 18 months at 3% through the CID. In last month's meeting Brian Ford had

brought up the topic of electronic giving. Nancy indicated that Daryl Dagit sent a note to Brian indicating that they can pursue this idea if they want.

Board of Christian Education – Laura Dobbelaire reported that Paula Norman will be joining the board. Last month's activity was bowling. Youth from our church and Sand Prairie participated. This month's activity will be helping elder members of the congregation with leaf raking, etc. Good Shepherd School will be singing at the church this month. Also, over 500 cans of food have been donated so far. These will go to the food pantries at St. John's and Sand Prairie. This week Good Shepherd will have a Grandparent's Day.

Board of Worship – Julie Wagner reported that the committee met last week. The committee will be doing the Advent dinner on November 30th. Julie indicated that they talked about their committee assignments and the same people are retaining their officer positions. The committee thanked Valerie Ferguson for the Fall banners that she donated. The committee will be decorating the church on the Saturday after Thanksgiving. Anyone who would like to help is welcome!

<u>Board of Evangelism</u> – Pastor Bishop reported that the committee did not meet this month but we did have Friendship Sunday this past Sunday. Pastor noted that we did have some visitors.

Nancy Drockelman brought up the topic of Pastor Bishop's wage and housing allowance as allocated in the 2022 budget. Pastor and Deanna have been doing some work on their house. In talking to their accountant, it was recommended that the allocation between wage and housing allowance be changed. Pastor's wage was shown as \$58,000 with a housing allowance shown as \$17,000. A motion was made by Nancy Drockelman, seconded by Dave Drockelman, to change the amount shown as wages to \$41,000 and housing to \$34,000. Motion carried.

Pastor Bishop thanked those who attended the special musical event held last month to benefit the LCMS Central Illinois District Deaf Ministry. Over \$1700.00 was raised. Pastor indicated that we may try to do something similar again next fall. Bob Oliverius also indicated that he has enjoyed all the special music at the services.

A motion was made by Bob Oliverius, seconded by Jennifer Kesselmayer, to close the meeting. Motion carried.

The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer.
