We Lutherans recognize that both in doctrine and in essence, we are in continuity with the church catholic, united to the believers in Christ of all times, extending back to the faithful people of the Old Testament. We do not understand ourselves to be a "new" church, but one in teaching and one in who we are as God's chosen people, together with all the Christians who have gone before us.

God tells us in Hebrews 12:22-23, "You have come to Mount Zion and to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, to an innumerable company of angels, to the church of the firstborn who are enrolled in heaven, and to God, the Judge of all, and to the spirits of the righteous ones who have been made complete." This passage tells us that when we become part of the church, we become one with all the people whom God has chosen for everlasting salvation, including those whose spirits have already been "made complete," that is, brought to the goal of heaven.

God also tells us Christians, "You are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God, built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus Himself being the cornerstone, in whom the whole structure, being joined together, grows into a holy temple in the Lord." *Ephesians 2:19-21* Again, we are told that we are one in Christ with all God's holy people, built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets. This means we are part of the same family and "structure," so to speak, as were the prophets of Israel and the apostles Jesus sent.

Again, we hear in Galatians 3:29, "If you are Christ's, then you are Abraham's seed, heirs according to the promise." This means we believers in Jesus Christ are the spiritual offspring of Abraham, who received the promise that his Seed would bless all the nations of the earth. (Genesis 22:18) We are one with the faithful of ancient Israel, who trusted in the promised Savior.

Therefore we Lutherans are not some group that is new or different from the ancient people of God. We strive not to engage in frivolous novelty, as though we just sprung up as some little sect that "does its own thing." Rather, we seek to teach and practice in conformity with the apostolic church through the ages, for we are part of this one church.

Luther put it like this: "We fabricate nothing new, but retain and hold to the old Word of God as the ancient Church confessed it; hence we are, with it, the true ancient Church, believing and teaching one and the same Word of God."

We Lutherans also declare in our Augsburg Confession: "we have introduced nothing, either in doctrine or in ceremonies, that is contrary to Holy Scripture or the universal Christian church. For it is manifest and evident (to speak without boasting) that we have diligently and with God's help prevented any new and godless teaching from creeping into our churches and gaining the upper hand in them." *Conclusion:* 5

Religious novelty and innovation inevitably lead to error. So instead of trying to be something "new and different and exciting," we Lutherans consciously hold onto that ancient Christian teaching, because that is to hold onto Christ! And in Christ, who is the same yesterday and today and forever, we have salvation!

Ross Gould called the meeting to order. A quorum was present. Pastor Bishop opened with devotions.

The March Parish Report was reviewed. A motion was made by Dodie Sheckler, seconded by Diane Gould, to approve the March Parish Report. Motion carried.

The March meeting minutes were reviewed. A motion was made by Dave Kesselmayer, seconded by Dave Drockelman, to approve the March meeting minutes. Motion carried

Treasurer's Report - Nancy Drockelman reviewed the March Treasurer's Report. There was a deficit in income for the month of \$3,788.99. For the year, we are seeing a deficit of \$25,684.09. On the check register, there is an expenditure for \$914.50 for altar cloths (funds were from donations to the Elders Care Fund to be used specifically by Diane Gould, to approve the March Treasurer's Report. Motion carried.

Board of Trustees - Dave Kesselmayer reported that the new coffee maker has been installed. A new light fixture Board of Worship - Dodie Sheckler reported that the committee fixed a toilet in the women's rest room. The Trustees disindicated needs to be done to maintain the insurance. Two bids were received for the roofing. The Trustees recommend going with Energy Resource Roofing with a bid of \$1,000.00. The Trustees will also handle some minor roofing repairs. A motion was made by the Trustees, seconded by Bob Oliverius, to accept the bid from Energy Resources Roofing for \$1,000.00 to repair the roof. Motion carried.
