OUR CHRISTIAN HOPE

As November brings with it the end of the Church Year, our focus moves to the "end things," the events that will come at the close of this present age. And so we give particular attention to our Christian hope. In fact, the Gospel themes for All Saints' Day and the last three Sundays of the Church Year all point strongly to our Christian hope.

But what is it for which we hope? As Christians, what is it to which we look forward the most? Perhaps many Christians would answer something like this: "I expect to go to heaven when I die." And that is good. It surely is part of our Christian hope. The peace and rest of the souls in heaven is without doubt much better than continued life in this sad, sin-ruined world. Paul wrote, "My desire is to depart and be with Christ, for that is far better." *Philippians 1:23*

Yet the life of the souls with Christ in heaven is by no means our entire hope! To be sure, it is a blissful condition, yet only an intermediate condition. Much more remains to come! For as long as the bodies of Christ's people are still here on earth, returning to dust in their graves, the Lord's work is not finished. Therefore, our Christian hope looks ultimately to what Christ will do when He returns — to the wonderful things that will begin when our Savior appears visibly!

On that day, Christ will raise all the dead, and change the bodies of all people who believe in Him to a glorious condition, very much like His own resurrected and glorious body. "For the trumpet will sound, and the dead will be raised imperishable, and we shall be changed." *I Corinthians* 15:52

On that same day, Christ will judge all people according to what they have done. For all of us who trust in Him, that will be a day of vindication! For Christ will judge us according to the works we


have done in Him – works that, by His grace, with all sin forgiven, are good and pleasing in His sight. So we and all believers in Christ will be publicly declared the true people of God. He will say, "Come, you who are blessed by My Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world." *Matthew 25:34* Those will be the words we hear from our Savior.

Then we will begin to live with God, in our sin-free bodies and souls, in the world to come. The Bible calls this "the new heaven and new earth." It will be a perfectly renewed creation – the world restored to a condition better than ever. And we will live in the immediate, unveiled presence of God, to worship Him and serve Him and even rule with Him for time that never ends! "The Lord God will be their light, and they shall reign for ever and ever." *Revelation* 22:5 That's our Christian hope!

Now, to call this "hope" is not to question its certainty. This is not a mere wish. It's not like saying, "I hope the weather is nice next Saturday," or anything else like that, which we can't know for sure. Rather, our Christian hope is what we know for certain because God has promised it, but we still have to wait for it. We know it's coming. For our resurrection and final vindication and the life of the world to come have all been guaranteed by the works and words of our Lord Jesus Christ! His death, His resurrection and ascension, together with His promises, all make our hope certain!

So let us live boldly and joyfully in our Christian hope, and not just these final few weeks of the Church Year, but all our days, until our hope finally gives way to experience at the Lord's coming!

HI-LITES OF ST. JOHN'S VOTERS ASSEMBLY October 13, 2025

Ross Gould called the meeting to order. A quorum was present. Pastor Bishop opened with devotions.

The September Parish Report was reviewed. A motion was made by Dave Kesselmayer, seconded by Randy Couch, to approve the September Parish Report. Motion carried.

The September meeting minutes were reviewed. A motion was made by Diane Gould, seconded by Dave Kesselmayer, to approve the September meeting minutes. Motion carried

<u>Treasurer's Report</u> - Rod Bollinger reviewed the September Treasurer's Report. September was a challenging month. Expenses outpaced income by \$17,455.96. Overall, for the year, we are showing a net income of \$21,104.22, due in large part to the bequest that was received earlier in the year. Expenses of note in the check register were the quarterly insurance premium payment, an Elder Care Fund item (that as noted in the Parish Report was offset with a donation of \$1,400.00), and a payment for the work done on the restroom in the new addition. The remainder were normal expenses. Ross Gould noted that we are well below budget on income vs expenses. Typically, donations do pick up during the last quarter of the year with the holidays. Nancy Drockelman motioned, seconded by Julie Wagner, to approve the September Treasurer's Report. Motion carried.

<u>Board of Trustees</u> – Dave Kesselmayer reported that the Trustees would like to thank Brock Benson for doing some painting work on the exterior of the Ewe's Home Furnishings building. Also, the Trustees received the quote for redoing the parking lots in the amount of \$4,775.00. The Trustees motioned, seconded by Gary Pool, to approve \$4,775.00 to City Coal & Asphalt for the resurfacing of the parking lots. Motion carried.

<u>Board of Elders</u> – Ross Gould reported that the Elders assisted with 2 requests for assistance. Special funds were donated for one of these requests. The Elders continue to make calls to congregation members who have not attended church for a while but have not been very successful with people getting back to them.

<u>Board of Finance</u> – The board has not met but Rod Bollinger indicated that the budget forms have been printed and passed out to the committee chairs. If possible, please have these back by the end of the month so the budget can be presented at the November meeting prior to voter approval at the December meeting.

<u>Board of Christian Education</u> – Laura Dobbelaire reported that the committee has not met but the last youth group activity was attended by 6 youth and went very well. The committee is looking into bowling as a possibility for the next activity. A Trunk or Treat will take place at Good Shepherd School on October 18th. Several teachers attended the LEA conference. This year in lieu of the children coming to the individual churches to sing, the children will be sending cards or letters to the congregations as a thank you.

John Neumann reported for Good Shepherd Lutheran School. John indicated that there will be a Bingo night at the school on November 20th. Also, the school is putting together a cookbook of recipes from congregation members, staff and student families. They would like all recipes submitted by October 31st. This Friday prizes from the Jog-A-Thon will be given out. John indicated that things are going well at the school this year. They had a couple of new students start after the beginning of the school year. All tuition fees are current. The board is actively working on getting a new principal for the next school year. John has talked to all 3 congregations about the status of the capital campaign. John is hopeful that the debt can be retired by next May.

<u>Board of Worship</u> – Julie Wagner reported that the committee met October 2nd. The committee will need 2 new members next year to replace members that are at the end of their terms. If you or anyone you know would like to volunteer, please let Julie know.

Board of Evangelism – Jennifer Kesselmayer reported that the committee wishes to thank all those who participated in the photo sessions for the new church photo directory. The committee is thrilled with the response. The next portrait sessions are on the 18th of October. Anyone planning on submitting their own digital photo must do so by October 27th. Print orders are expected to be delivered by mid-tolate November. The directory will be completed at some point after November. The committee would also like to ramp up our greeter system again for Sunday morning services. Please consider volunteering to be a greeter. You can add your name to one of the sign-up sheets inside the main church entrance. Finally, please complete the new, church-wide survey that Valerie Ferguson is coordinating. Everyone's input is important. The more input we collect through completed surveys, the better we can pinpoint our congregational strengths and weaknesses. If you have questions, please contact Valerie Ferguson. It was noted that the survey is per person, not per family.

<u>Board of Stewardship</u> – Nancy Swearingen reported that they are currently assisting 3 families. The committee will be sending gift cards to college students later this year. Please provide the names and addresses of any student so a card can be sent.

<u>Long Range Planning Committee</u> – No report.

Educational Grant Fund Committee – Laura Dobbelaire reported that she did check with the school as to whether there were any needs that might exist for which we could donate the interest earned from last year on this fund. Laura indicated that there is a need for new Chromebooks for some of the students. Approximately 35 new machines are needed at an average cost of \$375.00 each, for a total of around \$12,950.00. It was noted that some of the existing machines are so old that they cannot be updated. Ross Gould noted that we should also check with the other churches to see if they would contribute also. John Neumann indicated that the board will be discussing this.

<u>East Bluff Property Committee</u> – Dave Kesselmayer indicated that instead of having a clean-up day at the property, the Trustees were looking into having a company come out and do some of the clearing instead of tackling this on our own. Brian Fuelberth is investigating.

<u>Constitution By-laws Committee</u> – No report. Ross Gould noted that if any committees have any updates, the chair should let the By-Laws committee know.

<u>Unfinished business</u> – Ross Gould noted that over the years, Ewe's Treasures and Ewe's Home Furnishings have donated over \$1,700,000 to the school. The school has presented a banner, which can be viewed in the shop, to the organizations in recognition of this feat.

New business — Rod previously mentioned the need for committees to submit their budgets and Ross Gould noted that the committees should start looking for their people for next year. Questions have been raised in the past as to whether a person could serve more than 6 consecutive terms on a committee. It was clarified that the constitution recommends that someone serve no more than 6 consecutive terms but there really is nothing that would stop someone from serving longer in order to fill the open positions on committees.

A motion was made by Jennifer Kesselmayer, seconded by Julie Wagner, to close the meeting. Motion carried.

The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer.
